Things to do on 8/31 after 3:00 pm (metro-accessible):

1. Enjoy movie/short film at the IMAX or the local theater production, walking around the mall and enjoy fine dining in downtown DC

If you would like to venture out to the Mall at downtown DC, you can consider this option: take metro (RED line then BLUE line) and get off at the metro station near the museum of your choice. For metro direction to each museum, please refer to this link: http://www.si.edu/Visit/Maps.

If you can arrive at the National Air and Space Musem by 4:50 pm, you may catch a 45 minutes short film at the IMAX Theater or enjoy the 25-minute show at the Albert Einstein Planetarium. Otherwise (i.e. if you can not make it early), you may book the 135 minute 3-D movie (Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows, Part 2) at the IMAX theater of the National Museum of Natural History. 2. Catch a glance of the monuments or memorials in D.C. after dark

If you don't plan to watch the shows and museums while you're in downtown D.C., you may spend a few hours to see the illuminated monuments or memorials after dark. You may plan your trip based on the information on the National Park Service website: http://www.nps.gov/nacc/index.htm.

To make sure you will experience most of the monuments/memorials, you may consider the night tour options by searching for monument tour at night from the web. The tour companies offer transportation service (coach bus, trolley) and the prices range from \$32 to \$45 per person for a 2.5 to 3 hours tour (typically starts at 7:30 pm).

3. Enjoy the independent films at the Bethesda Row Cinema and the restaurants around Bethesda:

If you prefer to have a lighter late afternoon and evening schedule, you may consider this option since from Twinbrook metro station to Bethesda Metro station is less than 10 minutes away.

The closest metro station is the Foggy Bottom (through RED line to metro station, then Orange line to Foggy Bottom). But, you will have to take the cab to the Georgetown. Or, you can take RED line to the DuPont Circle and then take the DC circulator route which connects DuPont-Georgetown-Rosslyn:
